To support the management of the Foundation and provide more complete financial data for donors, the Board of Directors chose to implement a new software program during 2009. It will provide staff and donors timely information concerning funds and Foundation activities.


Like individuals, businesses and foundations across the country, the Foundation experienced the challenges resulting from a serious decline in the value of its investments. Given its prudent investment strategies, the Foundation dealt with a decline that was not as great as those encountered by many other entities. With the recovery experience in the general investment market, the value of the Foundation's net assets at the end of calendar year 2009 was more than one million dollars greater than the year before.

Vision Statement

The Winona Community Foundation will foster a healthy, dynamic community where all people have the opportunity to enhance the quality of their lives and the lives of others.

Finally, and most importantly, the Foundation continued to successfully fulfill its mission of improving the quality of life throughout the Winona community. General fund grants and grants from donor advised funds totaled nearly 1.75 million dollars during 2009. This amazing display of generosity was achieved during a time of severe economic difficulties. The grants demonstrate the commitment of the Board of Directors and fund advisors to act confidently. Such action addressed a wide range of needs and had significant benefits across the community. I fully expect that calendar year 2010 will see a similar commitment to the mission of the Foundation.

During my service on the Board of Directors I came to more fully appreciate the remarkable good that occurs when people come together with a common purpose, unite their resources and thereby achieve good for the community. It has been a privilege to be part of such a valuable organization. Given the leadership of its staff, the direction provided by Board members, the generosity of its donors and all who care deeply about the work of the Foundation, it will continue to be a very strong organization.

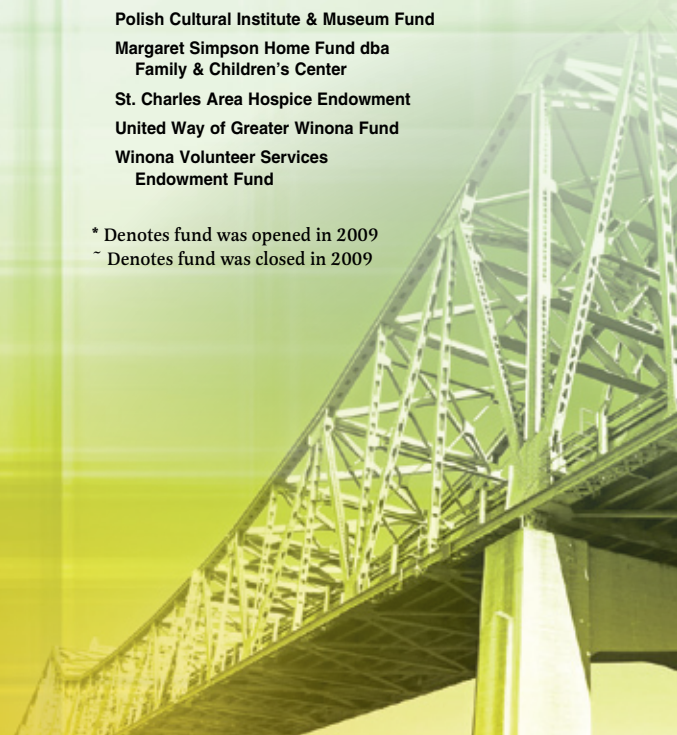

These funds may be ENDOWED or PASS-THROUGH.

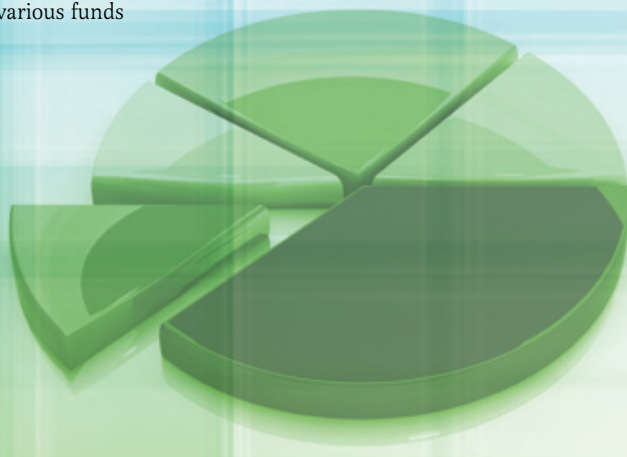
An ENDOWED FUND is one in which the principal is kept intact and only a certain amount of the earnings are available each year for granting purposes. Donors may require that the principal remain intact in perpetuity, for a defined period of time, or until sufficient assets have been accumulated to achieve a designated purpose.

A PASS-THROUGH FUND is one in which the fund Advisor may grant out of the principal.

PLANTING SEEDS FOR THE FUTURE

This year we will plant a seed; it is the newest tool in our tool belt of philanthropy. These Seed Funds offers individuals and charities an option to build charitable assets over several years. Rather than requiring \$5,000 immediately to begin a fund, Seed fund holders agree to a minimum initial contribution of \$500 to build their Seed. Once \$5,000 is accumulated via gifts and interest, the Seed Fund matures to a regular fund from which the donor can advise annual distributions. These Seed Funds will be an avenue for **everyone** to get involved in the Winona Community Foundation.

Donors interested in beginning such a fund will meet with the WCF staff to review specific details, which will then go to the Foundation's Board for approval prior to and beginning the fund.

A FLEXIBLE WAY TO GIVE

Starting a Seed Fund can be an individual or family endeavor. The paperwork is quick and easy.

- Gifts to an Seed Fund account can be made using cash, credit card, stocks or mutual funds
- A minimum of \$500 is required to open an Seed Fund
- A minimum annual contribution commitment of at least \$250 is requested, \$500 suggested, until the fund reaches \$5000, with the target of reaching this ten (10) years from the date of opening the Seed Fund
- Gifts are tax-deductible
- Once the \$5,000 mark is reached, the fund may be endowed or a noted as a pass-through fund that can operate as one of several different types such as donor advised, designated, field of interest or scholarship fund. The possibilities are limitless!

Minimal fees are charged while the fund grows (currently \$25 a year) and the normal start-up fee is waived when the fund reaches full size of \$5000 for being a component fund of the Foundation

The Foundation staff will be happy to discuss this fund with anyone that is interested. It is the easiest way to start you on your way to being a Philanthropist.

Our event this year was headlined "Reflections" and hosted at Jefferson's Big River Room November 3rd 2009. Guests mingled to the music of the SMU and WSU jazz bands while enjoying a buffet of soup and sandwiches, visiting with fellow donors, fund advisors, board members and staff. The evenings highlight was provided by Jeremy Miller with his heartwarming story of his family's roots, struggles and accomplishments. Jeremy told of his experiences with WCF, the funds he has personally used (Morrie Miller Athletic Foundation, started at WCF, Winona Track and Field fund, to name a few) to make big and small projects happen in Winona and topping this off with his announcement that he and his wife Janel are going to now personally open a fund at WCF. We are certain that everyone that attended will agree that he did a wonderful job. We thank Jeremy and his family for joining us to share their story.

PLANNED GIVING

Everyone should have an estate plan to ensure that their hard-earned assets reach loved ones and organizations held dear. Part of planning your estate intelligently may include maximizing the taxes you save by increasing the dollars you give. Proper estate planning could reduce or potentially eliminate estate taxes through planned giving, unless of course, the government falls into the category of organizations you would like to give to.

If your estate is quite large and contains highly appreciated property it may be possible to gift to charity while passing more to your heirs than otherwise would be possible without the charitable gift.

Giving strategies may span the range from simple to very complex. They may include giving during one's lifetime, by bequest, or both. This article will focus on giving after death.

PLANNED GIVING - WHAT IS IT?

A "planned gift" is a gift that will be distributed at some point in the future. The easiest way to make a planned gift is by designating the charitable organization as a beneficiary in your Last Will and Testament or in your Trust. The charitable organization can also be named as a beneficiary of a life insurance policy, annuity contract, and retirement account.

Avoid Taxes!

Making a charity the beneficiary of your IRA, 401(k) or other qualified plan allows you to escape income and estate tax levied on these plans on the Federal and State levels. This means that, in most situations, your donation is worth more to the charity than to your heirs.

Be Smart.

Typically it is smart to give the most-taxed asset in your estate to charity and leave the more favorably taxed property to your heirs. Making a planned gift assures that when you are gone your resources will keep giving to the future of that charity.

Current Limits.

The 2010 Estate Tax Exemptions are \$1,000,000 in Minnesota and (currently) unlimited Federally. This means that you can pass \$1,000,000 Estate tax free to the person or place of your choosing.

Effective estate planning usually takes time, effort and a good attorney. Proper planning allows your family to avoid the delay, dissension and needless expense that often occurs when a loved one dies intestate. Also, I recommend that you talk with your family about what your intentions are and why you made the choices you have made thereby potentially minimizing disputes and/or disappointment after you pass.

KIDS IN PHILANTHROPY

Winona Community Foundation (WCF) is in its fifth year of bringing Youth in Philanthropy (YiP) to the community as a way to teach young people about the art of giving and the importance of civic involvement.

Youth programs like YiP are on the cutting edge of a growing national movement to infuse young people into leadership and decision-making roles. Youth in Philanthropy taps into the energy of young people as they address local needs. In general, this is a youth-based version of the foundation's grant making committee.

The primary focus of the program is the educational component for the students. When introducing the YiP program to the approximate 70 students, only two had ever heard of the term "philanthropy." The word's origin is Greek and means love for mankind. Today, philanthropy means many things including the concept of voluntary giving to promote common good. Even people who are just moderately active in philanthropy are continually learning about their community needs.

Today's youth bring creative ideas, fresh perspectives and a refreshing look at the community. This program connects youth to the decision-making process, developing practical skills through their participation. Mother Teresa once said "to keep a lamp burning, we have to keep putting oil in it." WCF's goal is to ignite the flame early in one's life and continue to provide fuel -all with the help from the community.
